What is safeguarding?

- Safeguarding broadly means avoiding harm to people or the environment.
- FCDO's Safeguarding Unit focuses on Sexual Exploitation and Abuse and Sexual Harassment ("SEAH") in the aid sector both within FCDO, through the partners we fund and in the sector as a whole.
- SEAH matters because it causes harm to people and risks undermining the integrity of our work and preventing the achievement of planned objectives. So our safeguarding work aims to:
 - PREVENT it from happening
 - LISTEN to those who are affected
 - RESPOND sensitively but robustly
 - <u>LEARN</u> from every case

The focus of HMG's SEAH work

Delivery of the **four strategic shifts** from the October 2018 London summit:

- 1. Support survivors and victims, enhance accountability and transparency, strengthen reporting and tackle impunity
- 2. Incentivise cultural change through strong leadership, organisational accountability and better human resource processes
- 3. Agree minimum standards and ensure we and our partners meet or exceed them
- 4. Strengthen organisational capacity and capability across the international aid sector to meet the minimum standards.

Key messages for Partners

- HMG committed to tackling SEAH over long term as set out in our <u>2020 Strategy</u>
- We expect all partners to take this seriously and for this to be part of how we work together. Continuous learning and cultural change needed.
- We expect partners to do all they reasonably can to prevent SEAH and to act quickly and sensitively upon reports and suspicions that SEAH has occurred.
- We won't penalize partners for reporting, but want assurance from partners that they are taken a survivor centered approach and are handling cases appropriately.
- Before we decide to fund an organization we will conduct a Due Diligence Assessment including an in-depth look at their capacity and capability on safeguarding. The MOOCs have been designed with that in mind.

Main elements of external Capability work

- 1. OU course a certified, advanced training package for those leading on safeguarding to help professionalise safeguarding in the sector
- 2. <u>Safeguarding Resource and Support Hub</u> with a focus on grassroots CSOs and also global learning and networking opportunities
- 3. Funding to Core Humanitarian Standard Alliance e.g <u>PSEAH</u> Handbook and <u>PSEAH Investigator Training</u>
- 4. Funding to <u>HQAI</u> to encourage organisations to seek formal verification against CHS standard
- 5. Funded <u>on-line organizational culture tool</u> via Bond to supplement other <u>material</u>

MOOC 1 – how has the course been received?




2179 learners enrolled

Future Learn Platform - learning in the form of steps



Learning is broken down into bite-size chunks

Weeks are personally meaningful periods of study: 'Each week you will learn...'

Activities are elements of pedagogy. Each activity has a defined goal, learning methods, and an outcome.


Respond to challenges relating to safeguarding concerns using a survivorcentred approach.

Development of prevention mechanisms and their use when working with children and people with disabilities.

Reporting and responding to abuse and exploitation through community-based complaints mechanisms including whistleblowing, confidentiality, and survivor-centred referrals.

including community
engagement methodologies,
advocacy and marketing.

Implementation and learning from safeguarding practices when developing an organisational safeguarding culture.



Implementing safeguarding standards and principles when working:

- On safe programming in development and humanitarian settings
- With undertaking research and data collection

- With men and boys, and LBGTQI groups
- On protection of whistle-blowers
- On organisational Duty of Care to staff and associated personnel
- On accountability to affected people
- On developing an organisation culture though learning
